




## In January we asked you about your new year resolutions. Here is what you told us:

Her favorite books include Pride and Prejudice and Little Women.


She loves Disney and goes to the theme parks as often as she can.

> animals, magnets, microscopes, and animal X-rays on a lighted table, designed to spark the imagination and provide hands-on, experiential learning. Another area of the room holds their passports for Social Studies. For two weeks, they focus on a country learning about its animals and their habitats, topography and

The Character Club is one of the favorite times of the day, singing Bible songs and listening to stories about building Christ-like character. Reading time is also a favorite and some days are extra special because 6th grader Ainsley Hall and one of her friends will come down to read to them. They always pick the best stories!

Friday is Funday in Ms. Kelly's classroom! Learning is creative: building bridges, finding out what kinds of substances best dissolve candy canes, art projects like making the Eiffel Tower from straws after one of their stories, and lots more activities that make learning fun.
